#### Let's Get Ready for the Plant Auction!

Our June plant auction helps to raise money for all the good things we do throughout the year and we have fun doing it! Over the years we have been enjoying the auction we have found that healthy looking, well groomed plants, tagged with useful information are good sellers.

Recently Max posted to our website some useful tips for potting up divisions that I wrote last year. (Thanks for saving me some time!) To find those tips go to the May 3 entry under Garden Talk or under Garden Talk click on Gardening Tips.

So with those tips in the background let's fast forward to a few days before the auction. This is the time to prepare your labels. The general idea is to include the type of information you look for when buying plants. Typically this will include common and botanical name, height and spread, bloom color and time, sun or shade requirements and any special needs. If you can supply a picture, that is the frosting on the cupcake. The internet has made finding photos quite easy and plants catalogs are also a good source. I keep a file of my labels on my computer since chances are I will need them again.

I know it is a lot of work to pot and maintain plants for the auction so don't try to do masses of any one variety, especially if they are common plants. Focus your attention on plants you love because someone else is bound to love it too! Focus on what some gardeners call the "real doers" – plants that are reliable and make a solid contribution to a garden scheme.

It looks like watering will be a real time consumer this spring and in these dry conditions it is also a good idea to protect your transplants from too much sun (particularly in the afternoon) and the drying breezes. Don't hesitate to remove any damaged foliage and if the plant is getting very leggy you can in most cases cut it back. The idea is to remove sources of stress. And don't we wish someone would do that for us!

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One again we have been circulating signup lists for hostess/coordinators (particularly coordinators) for the general meetings. Coordinators **are not** responsible for everything. The Coordinator brings the gear to the meeting and works with the crew to organize everything for the day. The Crew helps with all the set up and brings decor & food. With everyone chipping in, the set-up gets done lickety split! The list of crew members for every month is in the yearbook, which comes out each September, and on the new EAGC website. Additionally, each newsletter will list the appropriate hostess/coordinator and crew for the current and following month. Please see under "Programs".

#### Here's a detailed explanation of how it all works:

#### **Coordinator Responsibilities**

- 1. Work with the crew to decide on a theme and who is providing a table cloth & centerpiece, cups & napkins and most importantly, the goodies! This can be done by email, phone or meeting.
- 2. Check the gear and see if anything needs to be restocked. The Hospitality Committee often checks as well, but just to be sure, take a look.
- 3. Bring the gear the morning of the meeting at 8:30 and open the church hall. The gear consists of a box which houses the coffee pot & instructions, a blue bag which houses the tea pot, coffee, sugar, tea, Splenda, stirrers, fake cream, hot chocolate and an orange bag which has plates, a table cloth, napkins and the like. The key to the church is in a little brown envelop in the outside pocket of the blue bag.
- 4. After the meeting, see that the next Coordinator gets all the gear for the upcoming month.

#### **Crew Member Responsibilities**

- 1. If you cannot make a meeting that you have volunteered to crew for, get a replacement for yourself and let the Coordinator know.
- 2. Help come up with a fun theme idea.
- 3. Show up at 8:30 on meeting day to set up the hall.
- 4. Bring your food item, centerpiece, etc.
- 5. Help set up the hall on meeting day. This includes making coffee, setting the table and setting up chairs for the meeting.
- 6. Help break down the hall by putting everything back in order and helping with the kitchen clean up after the presentation.
- 7. Expense receipts can be submitted to the treasurer for reimbursement.
